

#### **BILL HANSFORD (3RD)**

On 11th June 2013, our Association along with RAFA Plymouth lost a most loyal member, the Nation lost a true patriot, and I lost a dear friend with the passing of Bill Hansford. I knew Bill slightly at St Athan as an apprentice, but we really became friends when our Association was formed - when Bill immediately got in touch with West Country ex-apps and held reunions. Bill never married, but some 20 years or so ago, he met Frances, a widow and they became dear friends. Despite neither being drivers, they visited various museums and also attended parades in Devon; always sending me programmes of the events. On a visit to a Royal Marines Museum they were photographed in RM uniforms - I always smile at that one! I mentioned Bill's national pride: each St George's Day I received a card from him to mark the day; how many of us do that? In the early days of the Association, Bill and Francis attended Annual Reunions, but later the Big C struck and they were not able to attend, but I kept him up to date on events. He never referred to his health, just got on with his life. Frances is a friendly and amusing character, as indeed was Bill; about 6 or 7 years ago Frances had a stroke, was in hospital, then several nursing homes, before being able to move back to her own home - and where she still lives! From this time, Bill became almost a full-time carer, especially since Frances has had various operations. Bill needed to take two buses, each way, to get to Frances's home. When my wife and I were in Devon, we would meet up with Bill and Frances and have lunch, it was always so obvious how Bill was treated wherever we ate, he clearly was well liked. We telephoned each other periodically, and always had a few laughs en route! Bill was a keen football supporter of Plymouth and rarely missed a home fixture; he was so looking forward to the coming season. One event he recounted several times with pride! Whilst on leave in UK, in 1966, he somehow got a ticket for the World Cup Final (older members may recall England won that one!), he really treasured this memory. I had been trying to contact him for a few weeks to get some information on another member of his Entry, but could only leave messages, then, on 1st July, I received a call from Bill's nephew Paul Jell, who had picked up my messages, and he sadly advised me that Bill had passed Bill was taken ill on 11th June, went into hospital where away. sadly he died. Paul told me that Bill had been cremated on 24th June, with a number of RAFA members in attendance, and they provided a Union Flag for the ceremony, patently, within RAFA too, Bill was well regarded. Bill was a quiet, reserved character, but with a warm sense of humour, a man who cared for his friends, and who loved his country. He was invariably polite, and I have no doubt that when we meet he will immediately say "I'm sorry I didn't call you back!" # RAF CYCLE RIDE AROUND NORFOLK

A group of RAF personnel cycled around Norfolk visiting historical WW2 sites during the period 6-8 Sep 13. On the first day the ride ended at the RAF Heritage Centre Bircham Newton. The cyclists were met by Air Vice Marshall Matt Wiles CBE, Chief of Staff Personnel & Air Secretary. AVM Wiles is a Supply Branch officer and had intended taking part in the ride. After refreshments in the Heritage Centre, an excellent presentation was given in the The Birches Hotel Conference Room by Flt Lt Ali Morton of the RAF Presentation Team. Amongst those attending were the Mayor of Kings Lynn & West Norfolk, the Chairman of Norfolk County Council, Marshal of the RAF Sir Keith Williamson GCB AFC, the RAFA Area Vice President and RAF Marham Station Commander Gp Capt David Cooper. Yours truly represented the RAF Admin Apps Assoc. The photograph shows the RAF Cyclists and VIPs prior to the RAF Presentation Team talk. The Presentation Team revealed the RAF now has a strength of just below 35000!!? It appears the majority of aircraft servicing tasks etc are carried out by civilian contractors - whether this could be achieved in a total war environment such as WW2 is very questionable. The present RAF relies heavily on the RAF Reserves!! The RAF technician rank has been abolished - I spoke with the Stn Cdr RAF Marham who said he has just one J/T serving and a couple of Chief Techs. The RAF Regiment have introduced the rank of Lance Cpl to replace the rank of SAC - this is to ensure greater compatibility when on joint RAF/Army Operations. With the limited current strength of the RAF, I questioned that in the last 2 or so years I have seen 15-20, and more, promotions as new posts to 1/2 star rank - some of the post titles seemed to be something from Star Trek! My question was whether the RAF was becoming top heavy?! A matter raised by a senior Naval Officer some years ago who cited the RAF had 450 Group Captains!! It seem the Forces are committed to retaining a senior structure so as to maintain a 5 star Chief of Defence Staff who has direct access to Cabinet Ministers! Lets face it, what clout would the Head of the Army have if it was an RSM - I can hear your responses already!! In essence, the salami slicing starts at the bottom!! All in all, an eniovable dav/evening and the RAF personnel I met were as dedicated and committed as we were despite the present climate and pressures in the Armed Services.

### JOHNNIE JOHNSON'S SPITFIRE EN398 <u>"FLIES" AGAIN</u>

In the summer of 2012, my good friend, Brian Smith, ex-BA Captain, balloon skipper and live wire, felt the time had come to plant his feet firmly on the ground. He had paid a visit to the Air Transport Auxiliary (ATA) Museum in Maidenhead, Grandma Flew Spitfires, because a balloon event nearby had been cancelled due to bad weather. At the museum there is a Spitfire simulator that drew his attention. On the way home he suggested to his wife Cecilia, that he might like to build a simulator just like the one in Maidenhead. When he started talking to his friends about this, there was no shortage of enthusiasm and the project got under way with an extraordinary amount of local specialist knowledge and support. First came the cockpit itself. Creative Cockpits, based in Cumberland, provided the kit in a flat pack form using computer numerical control (CNC) cut recycled plastic for both the main frame and skin. Although not traditional material, assembly is very similar to the original method. The finished product is surprisingly strong and a great way of demonstrating aircraft construction techniques of the day. Brian lives in an ancient farmhouse with a number of out-buildings. A small barn was chosen for the project and all was set. The barn had been a family hidey-hole and took some time to clear. A local firm, West Sussex Antique Timber, agreed to sponsor the project and they laid a superb damp-proof solid oak floor. We covered the walls in hessian and put sticky tape criss-cross fashion on the windows in case we were attacked by the enemy! We held a number of planning meetings with half a dozen or so enthusiasts and then assembled one weekend in October last year and put the skeleton of the cockpit together in what seemed no time at all. Over the next few weeks the skin was applied, the seat fixed in place, and paint was brushed carefully over the surface in camouflage colours of dark green and grey. The inside paint was of the traditional light green shade. It was beginning to look very good indeed. While all this was going on, those in the team responsible for the hard and software were creating a specification for the computer and choosing the programs. Dell Computers built the tower and delivered it. Microsoft's Flight Simulator X was purchased and installed together with RealAir's Spitfire IX. This aircraft represents EN398, the most famous of the Spitfires flown by Wing Command J E (Johnnie) Johnson. Flying this aeroplane between April and October 1943, he shot down twelve aircraft and shared another five plus six that were damaged while he was commanding the Kenley Wing. Next we needed to install the cockpit modules; these included the spade handled control column with its support frame and adjustable hydraulic pitch & roll dampers, the rudder pedal module with cast aluminium pedals and hydraulic damper, the control quadrant with throttle, propeller pitch & mixture levers, column pitch trim module and the landing gear lever. All this came from a small manufacturer from Devon, SpitSim, who delivered and installed the equipment for us. Finally came the screens. It so happened that Tim Worrall., Managing Director of Airwave Europe Limited, who supply flat screen televisions to hotels and other places, heard of the project and offered his assistance. We have three 48-inch screens wrapped around the front of the cockpit, giving an excellent and realistic display. A fourth, small, screen was installed inside the cockpit providing the array of instruments. Behind the simulator, and occupying half the small barn, we have our crew-room decorated with all sorts of memorabilia, photos, and paintings, mainly of Spitfires. Hanging on nails and hooks around the crew-room are uniform jackets, caps, flying suits, leather helmets and goggles. There are contemporary logbooks donated by friends whose relatives flew in the war and a couple of newspapers of the day. In one corner there is a pair of sheep-skin flying boots, on a wall a replica of an ops-room clock keeps us on time and a Tannoy box adds to the realistic setting. We have recently received a visit from a 94-year old lady who

was one of the ferry pilots of the ATA during the war, and at least two Spitfire display pilots have taken our simulator aloft singing its praises in the visitors' book. It is hard to explain to anyone who has not sat in one of these amazing cockpits. Taxiing is not easy, taking off involves full right rudder correction to combat the powerful torque delivered by the four-bladed propeller. Once in the air, among the puffy clouds, one becomes isolated from those watching with help the noisy growl of the Merlin engine vibrating the whole structure. Landing literally brings you down to earth as you line up with the runway, begin breathing rapidly, lower the gear and engage the flaps. Taxiing back to the dispersal or the refueling point tends to bring the heart rate back to normal and a feeling of great satisfaction wells up inside. This is a partially commercial enterprise, based in the picturesque village of Wisborough Green in West Sussex, providing an escapist hour or two for a lucky birthday-boy who may bring a party of up to five others to join in the fun. The RAF Benevolent Fund benefits from donations by clients who will be rewarded with a fridge magnet bearing our logo. They have helped us with the loan of a few contemporary artifacts, including a couple of telephones from the forties. Finally, a certificate, signed by one of the instructors rounds off an amazing experience.
